- 1. Introduction. The following notices are intended to assist buyers, particularly those that are new to our saleroom and internet bidding platforms. Our auctions are governed by our Terms and Conditions of Business incorporating the Terms of Consignment, the Terms of Sale supplemented by any notices that are displayed in our saleroom, the online catalogue listing or announced by the auctioneer at the auction. Our Terms and Conditions of Business are available for inspection at our saleroom and online at www.forumauctions.co.uk. Our staff will be happy to help you with any questions you may have regarding our Terms and Conditions of Business. Please make sure that you read our Terms of Sale set out in this catalogue and on our website carefully before bidding in the auction. In registering to bid with us you are committing to be bound by our Terms of Sale.
- Agency. As auctioneers we usually act on behalf of the seller whose identity, for reasons of confidentiality, is not normally disclosed. If you buy at auction your contract for the goods is with the seller, not with us as auctioneer.
- 3. Estimates. Estimates are intended to indicate the hammer price that a particular lot may achieve. The lower estimate may represent the reserve price (the minimum price for which a lot may be sold) and cannot be below the reserve price. Estimates do not include the buyer's premium, VAT or other taxes and fees (where chargeable). Estimates may be altered by a saleroom notice.
- 4. Buyer's Premium. The Terms of Sale oblige you to pay a buyer's premium on the hammer price of each lot purchased. All lots are offered under the Auctioneer's Margin Scheme and VAT (at 20%) is included within the buyer's premium. Our rate of buyer's premium is 30% of the first £150,000 of the hammer price, reducing to 24% of the hammer price from £150,001 to£1,000,000 and then 14.4% of the hammer price in excess of£1,000,000. Buyers wishing to purchase lots outside the margin scheme must notify us and will be subject to VAT (currently at 20%) on the hammer price in addition to buyer's premium (and other applicable charges) which may be reclaimed as input VAT or in the event of export outside the EU.
- Items with zero rated VAT. Please note that no VAT is added to the buyers' premium on certain zero rated goods, such as qualifying books.
- 6. Inspection of goods by the buyer. You will have ample opportunity to inspect the goods and must do so for any lots that you might wish to bid for. Please note carefully the exclusion of liability for the condition of lots set out in Clauses 2.2, 2.10 and 11 of our Terms of Sale.
- 7. **Export of goods.** If you intend to export goods you must find out in advance if
 - a. there is a prohibition on exporting goods of that charactere e.g. if the goods contain prohibited materials such as ivory

- 9. Commission bidding. - 10. Live online bidding. When using our BidFORUM platform to participate in the auction through your account on our website there will be no additional charges. 


THE RAILWAY COLLECTION OF THE LATE SIR WILLIAM McAlpine, Bt. (1936-2018)

Bill McAlpine was the fifth baronet, and the fourth generation in the family firm of builders and engineers. He couldn't have made a happier choice of trades to be born into, and had a passion for building and trains. "Passion" is a weasel word these days, but in Bill's case it is genuinely appropriate, for he brought the most amazing gusto to everything he addressed. He had a good dose of the family's powerful collecting gene and filled his house with books, and his garden with trains, stations, lines, bridges and all the other wonderful hardware associated with the genre. And then there is the private menagerie as well, with meerkats greeting you at the front door. His railway line was not long, but it importantly had a gradient of 1 in 13, which means that ascending engines can get up a really big head of steam. Visitors were allowed to drive the trains uphill, but not down.

The collection offered here could be described as Bill's "last" book collection. Like many serious collectors, things came and went to a certain extent. What is presented here is a fascinating and balanced collection, covering the engineering, commercial and cultural aspects of the history of the railways. There are rare colourplate books from the incunabulum days of rail; manuscript material from Huskisson and the Stephenson family; legal and commercial records of some of the greatest commercial enterprises of the industrial revolution; photographs and literature of thousands of engines. Like all great and big collections, Bill's gives the reader an idea of the scale of the enterprise being recorded, and the remarkable collection of early Bradshaws for instance includes 23 for one year alone. The clerical and organisational achievement of the Bradshaw enterprise, linking the various timetables of the UK into a cohesive and reliable whole, was at its time the greatest organisational feat ever attempted. A proto-internet of information, on which the nation ran, and incidentally providing a framework for alibis and plot devices: "No, take your books of mere poetry and prose; let me read a time table, with tears of pride. Take your Byron, who commemorates the defeats of man; give me Bradshaw, who commemorates his victories. Give me Bradshaw, I say!" says Chesterton's The Man who was Thursday.

We first met Bill and Judy after they rashly bid a huge price for "Lunch with a Bookseller" at a charity auction for the Brunel museum, which led to a hilariously entertaining lunch with the two of them – repeated more than once. His sad death in 2018 has lessened the lives of all who knew him – he was massively democratic in his friendships and made little distinction between volunteer engineers on his railway and cabinet ministers. While not in the habit of offering books at auction, we are not specialists in railway books, and felt that a more public dispersal would allow more people to join in this celebration of a great enthusiast.

The extraordinary quality and number of woodcuts give a wonderful graphic account of industrial activity in the mid-sixteenth century, eg. the use of waterpower, furnaces etc., and include a very early depiction of a railway.





* Bake was the first to suggest and plan a railway in Holland, but his project came to naught as the canal and river systems already in place were considered sufficient for the transport of goods. Bake's employee however was the first entrepreneur to successfully establish a railway. Oeynhausen was a wealthy German geologist and patrSemechanical engineering at Tübingen, and his work is one of the earliest European works to discuss steam-powered locomotion.

Probably the grandest work from the early days of railways, containing many iconic images familiar because of their use in later works.








* The Lengths and Levels are often found bound together with the Extracts of Minutes. The London to Birmingham Company had their original Bill refused after several *nimby* peers objected. However, in 1833 the Bill was passed and work started later that year, by 1838 it was complete. The journey took five and a half hours.

& One of the foremost sources of contemporary information on civil engineering issues relating to early railways and rolling stock. The First Series mostly concerns the London & Birmingham Railway; the Second includes aspects of the Great Western, the London & Croydon, and specifications and contracts for works on the Birmingham & Gloucester; the Third (and Fourth) are mostly devoted to French railways. Brees was one of those who engineered the London to Birmingham line under Stephenson. He later went to New Zealand, and Australia, and produced a topographical work on New Zealand.

The Railway Club (disbanded 2009) was the first club for railway enthusiasts, founded in 1899.

The final item is scarce. Mann's was a compressed air system rather than a vacuum model. It failed to ignite public interest, but nevertheless was a prescient invention and is one of the cornerstones of the historic pneumatic railway literature.



There is a street named after him in Brussels. This expanded fifth edition includes the only known appearance in print of Josias Jessop's two reports on the intended railway from the Cromford Canal to the Peak Forest Canal.

Wood's work was also much expanded from the first edition as that offering had become completely out of date since its publication in 1825. It includes discussions on all the trials that had been held in the intervening period, and much else besides. Wood was a colleague of Stephenson and one of the foremost engineers of the first era of steam locomotion.







All are a mine of information during this period of intense railway mania, including many important railway maps of the various intended and completed lines throughout the UK and interesting articles with extensive working diagrams for the Pinkus pneumatic system, and a proposal with a folding map for an Indian railway between Calcutta and Saugur on the coast. Despite the relatively austere tone of this scientific journal a few flights of fancy sometimes intrude: "...Let the reader fancy himself flying over the country at the rate of 120 or 140 miles an hour, or starting from Edinburgh at five in the morning and being comfortably seated at breakfast in London at half past eight...".

The first railway in Ireland had difficulties to overcome. One opponent, Mr. O'Hanlon, told a Railway Committee of the House of Commons in 1833 that it "would be a monstrous thing that the solid advantages of commerce, manufactures, and all the blessings resulting therefrom, should he sacrificed to a few nursery maids descending from the town of Kingstown to the sea at Dunleary, to perform the pleasures of ablution." Storms also caused a delay as a vital bridge was destroyed. It was finally opened in December 1834 with two engines, the *Vauxhall* and the *Hibernia*, which were able to reach speeds of over thirty miles an hour.

* Clegg and Samuda's patented atmospheric railway ran on a section of line at Wormwood Scrubs, using a fixed airtight tube and a piston attached to the car. It made many journeys and successfully ran up an incline of 1/100, returning on the track by gravity. The system was cheaper to build and had many advantages over locomotive power, being used in the Dalkey to Kingstown line where it achieved in one run a speed of about 60mph. The Irish line ran from 1843 for over 10 years. It was the first commercial line of its type.

Robert Mallet was an Irish civil engineer, not to be confused with Charles François Mallet who had been sent by the French Government to report on the Dublin Dalkey atmospheric railway and who also issued a report. Robert Mallet came into dispute with the Samudas, builders of the Dalkey line, over patent issues, which are referred to here. He later built the Fastnet Rock lighthouse.

The Marquis Achille de Jouffroy proposed a rail system with a central cog arrangement, it was reviewed favourably in the Railway journal of 1844.

& Optimism abounds in the committee's deliberations in the first item, but the scheme was stillborn. In summing up Telford suggests that the project "is one of the most important that has ever come under my consideration". A rare work, with only 5 copies recorded worldwide, two in America, the remaining three in Scotland.

The Edinburgh & Glasgow Railway opened at a cost of over a million pounds on the 21st February 1842. It was an enormous success with three times the estimated passenger traffic. By 1850 the line required 58 engines and 216 carriages. A rare survivor from the earliest days of intercity railway travel in Scotland.

It was the first country to have a national rail network, and beyond the economic benefits their development was seen as a key element in forging the identity of the new state founded in 1830.








He was both agent and engineer for the firms in Manchester, as Rennie was in London. Ewart later pursued a business career, mainly in textiles, and he bought several Watt engines, continuing as their de facto agent.



He married Jeanne Amirault, a member of a distinguished Huguenot family.



A MAGNIFICENT DELUXE COPY IN EXCEPTIONAL CONDITION. "The year 1812 saw the publication of one of the more remarkable illustrated books ever to appear in France. Titled 'Anatomie du gladiateur combattant,' it was inspired by contemporary rhetoric celebrating the role of the arts in the new post-revolutionary society. At the same time, it was a magnificent display of hard-won knowledge of human anatomy and a tribute to medical science" (Jean-Galbert Salvage and His Anatomie du gladiateur combattant: Art and Patronage in Post-Revolutionary France, Raymond Lifchez in: Metropolitan Museum Journal 44, 2009, p. 163).

Salvage (1772-1813) was an army surgeon, anatomist, and skilled draftsman. He created three monumental écorchés, i.e. casts of human bodies represented without skin. He used the bodies of soldiers "in their prime" who were killed in duels, rather than patients who died as a result of illness. Salvage arranged his cadavers in the same pose as the Borghese Gladiator sculpture and meticulously worked out the skeletal and muscular anatomy. Salvage's écorchés are preserved at the Ecole Nationale des Beaux-Arts.

This copy is enhanced by the inclusion of the counterproof plates, which show an important stage between Salvage's original drawings and the finished engraving. A counterproof is a proof of a proof - the artist takes an impression from the engraved plate and while it is still wet lays another piece of paper over it and runs it through the press, creating a counterproof. Because the original proof is the mirror image of the plate, the counterproof is the mirror image of a mirror image, so that the image is aligned the same way it is on the plate. The artist can draw on the counterproof and work from that to the plate without having to reverse the image. The counterproofs here do not show the titles or captions, which were added later.



Malcolm was the eldest son of Sir Charles Malcolm (1782-1851), naval officer. He followed in his father's footsteps, serving in the Royal Navy for his entire career and becoming Rear Admiral in 1882. His long naval career took him to North and South America, the West Indies, the Baltic, the English Channel, Egypt, and the East Coast of Africa. After he retired from active service in 1873, he entered the Turkish services as Pasha and was employed at Constantinople as Director General of the Abolition of the Slave Trade and Judge of the Slave Courts.






★ GERALD BRENAN'S IMPASSIONED ACCOUNT OF HIS UNHAPPY RELATIONSHIP WITH DORA CARRINGTON. The root of all this unhappiness lay with the relationship of Dora Carrington with Lytton Strachey, who had met during during the First World War and developed into a close and unbreakable bond, despite Strachey's homosexuality. In 1917 they set up home together, and in 1918, Ralph Partridge came to live with them. Strachey fell deeply in love with Partridge and Carrington married him in 1921 in order to stay close to Strachey. Partridge's closest friend was Gerald Brenan who became Carrington's lover, and whose relationship seems to have fluctuated according to Carrington's feelings about Strachey's and Partridge's behaviour. Lytton Strachey died in January 1932 of undiagnosed stomach cancer and a few weeks later Dora Carrington shot herself.

"CRD made love to me because R[alph] was in love with her; when I fell entirely in love and R. out, she left me for him, assisted by an unconscious jealousy of Frances [Marshall]. She [Carrington] will always be the same, restless, irritable, loving only those who do not love her, and turning quickly away from those who do. No one more unfit for social life could be found, and yet why do I still say that she is good, affectionate, gentle?" - Brenan.

Brenan's diary mentions other members of the Bloomsbury Group, including Virginia Woolf, on her character, "Wherever Virginia goes, she undoes a knot like a Lapland witch and lets out a war", and her novels, "She conceives the characters clearly, different thoughts occupying their minds, yet they all speak in one tone. The peculiarity of V's novels lies in no part of the book being adapted for action...her characters are bundles of images - mostly memories: those abstracts qualifications which throw light on how they may be expected to behave under varying circumstances are absent: and, as nothing whatever does happen in the course of the book, and in V.'s conception of the world nothing, apparently, ever can happen, one does not miss anything".

Francis Gastrell's destruction of the mulberry tree in the garden of New Place in 1759 due to invasive tourism is well known. That, and the subsequent demolition of the house is seen as the ultimate piece of villainy by a man who cared nothing either for Stratford or Shakespeare. Thomas Sharp purchased the remains of the tree and carved a variety of Shakespearean souvenirs, commemorating the immortal bard. After Sharp's death the remaining stock of wood was acquired by John Marshall, who continued to make memorial objects from the wood. Realistically speaking, objects carved from Shakespeare's mulberry tree are the closest one can get to owning an item directly associated with the Immortal Bard. As the stamp on the bottom of the box testifies, the present writing box is from the first generation of memorial objects made from the wood, and thus carries added associational value. the present writing box remains servicable as a container for writing materials, and is an apt reminder of the creative power of the pen and the world's greatest playwright.

For there was Nanny always in the way. Nanny who claimed so much of my affection. And on the rare occasions when Nanny was out of the room, there was my mother in her place. Where did he fit in? Nowhere special. And now here was Soldier. You could see how my eyes lit up at the very thought of Soldier, at the mere mention of his name.
