

\* First edition of a Franciscan commentary which addresses economic theory. Teaching at Paris university, Mediavilla was an active participant in the debate over 'poverty' which subsumed the Franciscan Order for much of the 13th century and eventually led to the breaking-away of the heretical Fraticelli sect in 1296. In his commentary on the fourth book of Lombard's Sentences, Mediavilla expounds some interesting comments on the ethics of contracts and annuities against those who viewed them as usurious, and draws out more elaborate arguments about wider economic systems.

\* First edition of this Roman History, which also includes a life of the author by Marcantonio Sabellico. The Italian humanist Laetus ran a notorious academy at Rome, which often came under the scrutiny of the Papal authorities. Charges brought against him personally or his academicians included sodomy, paganism, heresy and conspiracy against the Pope.




**Vigerius (Marcus)** Decachordum Christianum, collation:  $aa^8 a^{10} b - z^8 & A^{10} B - E^8 F^{10}$  AA  $BB^8$ , aa8 blank, title and author's arms within woodcut border signed F.V., 10 full-page metalcuts, that of the Nativity signed 'L' and that of Pentecost signed 'F.V.', all within one of two repeated woodcut borders, 33 smaller metalcuts illustrating the life of Christ, all but two criblé, initial spaces with guide-letters, repair to upper margin of title, the odd small marginal repair, some spotting (or occasional foxing) and staining, water-stained at end, mostly to lower inner gutters and lower margins, but just encroaching on text on occasions, lightly browned, late 19th / early 20th century vellum, leather title label to spine (rubbed), upper joint just starting, but holding firm, folio (304 x 204mm.), Fano, Hieronymus Soncinus, 1507.

\* A wide-margined copy of the first edition of what is considered to be the finest book from the press of Soncino, the first printer at Fano. Vigerius joined the Franciscan order while his great uncle (the future Pope Sixtus IV) was general of the order, and it was to Sixtus IV that he owed his advancement. He was made bishop of Senigallia in 1476, Governor of Castel Sant'Angelo, and a cardinal in 1505. Vigerius returned to his studies in 1506, producing the *Decachordum*, a treatise on asceticism following the life of the Holy Family, which he dedicated to his cousin Pope Julius II. Our copy with foliation correct on f. Ixxix (unlike the Harvard copy) and incorrect on f. Ixxix (reads Ixxxiiii (corrected by hand in ink), as in the Garden copy); and with seventh and eighth chorda incorrectly headed sixth and seventh (corrected by hand in ink).




\* Editio princeps of the plays of Aeschylus, which is scarce at auction. The edition was edited by the humanist Francesco Torresano, and includes his 'to the reader', which highlights the continuation of Aldus' programme of publishing Greek and scientific texts. The source manuscript was derived from the early Byzantine Codex Mediceus and lacked the leaves containing the last 500 lines of Agamemnon, and the opening of Choephoroi, so that here the two are merged as a single play. It was not until the Henri Estienne edition of 1557 that this was rectified.

Includes a dedicatory epistle from Gian Francesco Asolano to Altobello Averoldi, legate at Venice to Pope Leo X. Pontanus (1429-1503) was an Italian humanist, diplomat, scholar and poet.



Catholic Church.- Council of Trent.- [A SAMMELBAND OF 69 ADDRESSES, DECREES AND OTHER DOCUMENTS FROM THE COUNCIL OF TRENT], in Latin, individual works ranging from 2ff. to 16ff. in length, many with woodcut papal arms of Pius IV to titles, nearly all other titles with woodcut printers' devices, one in red and black, a large folding woodcut illustration at rear (some light browning at folds, single tiny hole with verso paper repair), 6ff. ink manuscript index to rear likely in 18th century hand, very scattered minor spots or stains, a couple of individual works with damp-stains or foxing, but overall generally clean, eighteenth century vellum with gilt label to spine, somewhat toned and soiled, 4to (c.206 x 140mm.), Brixen, Padua, Riva del Garda, 1562-63.

\* An incredible record of the third and final period of the Council of Trent, spanning 1562-63, this single-volume collection of 69 individual works is possibly historically unique. With the highest number of attendees, including a significant delegation from France (now embroiled in its own religious civil wars), it was in these final sessions of the Council that many rules and reforms characteristic of the Counter Reformation were established. The majority of the 69 pamphlets here-bound are addresses ['Oratio'] to the Council, delivered by an array of pan-European theologians, Augustinians, Dominicans and Franciscans, ambassadors, archbishops, cardinals and oriental patriarchs covering a similarly wide array of topics. Additionally present are the Decrees from the final five sessions, a detailed list of provincial Cathedrals and another of papal legates and various papal documents such as Bulls and Motuo Proprio. Also of interest are the imprints - nearly all published at the near-by provincial towns of Brixen (or Bressanone) in the mountains to the north and Riva del Garda to the south, today both in the Italian province of Trentino-Alto Adige but then in the Holy Roman Empire - which not only speak of the Council's fascinating geo-political locating at Trent, but also suggest a desire for rapid print and distribution particularly north of the Alps, a recognition of and retaliation with the power of the printed word as a weapon in the arena of religious reform.

\* An extremely rare Amulet, or Prayer Roll, worn wrapped around the arm as protection against the dangers of childbirth, maladies, sorcery and any other sorts of danger.

This specimen begins "Incipient nomina sancta Jhesu Christi", followed by a string of names: "Messiahs"; "Sother"; "Emmanuel"; "Saboath" etc. There follow eight further sections, some with headings specifying the disease against which help is sought ("contra fluxum sanguinis, Oratio Sci Sigismundi regis et martyris contra febresi...). The fourth section is to protect a woman in childbirth ("Si mulier laboret in partu", she is to put this "Breve" under right breast "et illico deo auxilliante liberabit se"). In section five the names of the "Seven Sleepers" are given as a magic formula, perhaps to induce sleep.

\* Piot worked for the earl of Warwick in the 1430s and later as Henry VI's French secretary, writing several letters on behalf of the king and Queen Margaret to Charles VII over negotiations for the surrender of the County of Maine. "... Henry VI engaged for his French business a number of French secretaries, who lived in England for considerable periods and probably brought with them families and households that swelled the immigrant population of London and its suburbs. Several of these secretaries chose to stay permanently in England and, like Gervase le Vulre in 1441, obtained letters of denizenship. They were encouraged to do so not only because of the nature of their work, but also because they fell victim to the Valois advance after 1436; some, like Michael de Paris and Jean Rinel lost lands and goods in France and sought recompense in England." – Ralph A Griffiths. The Reign of King Henry VI, 1981.

Sir Richard Harrington (c. 1399-1462), soldier, bailly of Caen, later controller of the Household of Henry VI.



\* Provenance: Written for use in England, with SS. Augustine, Edward the Confessor, Alphege, Dunstan, Swithun ("Swichin"; also in Litany in same form), Mildred, Oswald, Cuthbert, Edmund of Abingdon (in red), Edmund the Martyr (in red) and Richard, bishop of Chichester (in red), in the Calendar. The presence of St. Erkenwald of London as an addition to the Calendar in a near-contemporary hand may suggest the book's use in London or its vicinity. In the last years of the fifteenth century and the opening years of the sixteenth, a back flyleaf was used to record "The birthes of all the / ['my' crossed through] childryn of henry / Sad Leydr [Saddler]" (with the births of his sons John and 'Rafe', and his daughter 'Annys' all in the reign of Henry VII: 1485-1509). Apparently remaining in England throughout the Reformation, and set aside rather than adapted to comply with Protestant textual sanctions.

Text: This volume comprises: a Calendar; the Hours of the Virgin, with Matins, Lauds, Prime, Terce (mistitled as "Ad nonam"), Sext, Nones, Vespers and Compline; the Seven Penitential Psalms, with a Litany of Saints, prayers and collects; the Office of the Dead; and Psalms 118 and 138, introduced as the "Commendationes animarium" (wanting first few lines; the text of the first of these Psalms was often used alongside the Hours of the Virgin, and the two also survive as a separate text for the commendation of souls in a Rouen Book of Hours of c. 1420-30 recorded in a private Danish collection by E. Drigsdahl, his codex 'cuj 1').



Shakespeare (William).- Spencer [married names Stanley, Egerton] (Alice, Countess of Derby, wife of Ferdinando Stanley, 5th Earl of Derby, 1559-1594, patrons of the company of players that joined the Lord Chamberlain's Men with Shakespeare as chief playwright). Petition to Alice Countess of Derby from Alexander Bannyon and referencing the Earl of Derby, "whereas aboute a month past yt pleased the Ladie Stafford, and the Lady Digby to write their favorable lines unto ye La: in my fathers behalf, that in compassion of the poore of all of him, his wife and x children, most of them younge, yor honor would vouchsafe to extend yor goodness towards him in permitting him to enioy his his finale livinge of xxii s... whout paying... a lease graunted by the... late Earle of Derby...", manuscript on paper, 12 lines, 1p. with conjugate blank, folds, browned, folio, ?Dragon watermark, [c. 1595].

\* Shakespeare connection. Alice Spencer married Ferdinando Stanley, Lord Strange, heir to the earldom of Derby, secretly in 1579/80. Ferdinando was one of the richest noblemen in the country, sponsored actors and playwrights and wrote poetry. He succeeded his father as Earl of Derby in 1593, his playing company Lord Strange's Men renamed "Derby's Men". Scholars believe that Shakespeare was involved with this company as an actor and playwright. The troupe produced Titus Andronicus and the trilogy of Henry VI, Parts I, II & III. For a month after Ferdinando's death in 1594, his company of players performed at their home of Lathom House, Lancashire as the Countess of Derby's Men. "This was the company of players that split with members joining the company that formed the Lord Chamberlain's Men in 1594, with Shakespeare as chief playwright." - Oxford DNB

"A beautiful, well-educated, and cultured woman, Alice entered the queen's household and became prominent at court . . . She encouraged the visitation of acting companies in the 1580s, when the Queen's Men, Earl of Leicester's Men, and Earl of Essex's Men appeared there many times." - Oxford DNB

Bannyon had two powerful supporters in his petition, comprising, Dorothy Lady Stafford (1526-1604), daughter of Henry tenth Lord Stafford, by Ursula Pole; grand-daughter of George Duke of Clarence, brother of King Edward IV; married 1540s (second wife) Sir William Stafford (died 1556), his first wife Mary Boleyn was sister of Queen Anne Boleyn and Abigail Lady Digby (c.1552-1611), daughter of Sir Arthur Heveningham (d. 1557), by Mary Shelton (buried 1571), a first cousin of Queen Anne Boleyn, first cousin once removed of Queen Elizabeth I.

\* SHAKESPEARE AND TOLKIEN CONNECTIONS.

Shakespeare Connection. Shakespeare purchased New Place in May 1597 from William Underhill, described as 'a subtle, covetous, and crafty man'. "Two months later Underhill died at Fillongley, near Coventry, after orally bequeathing 'all his lands to his firstborn Fulke. In 1599 Fulke, still a minor, was hanged at Warwick for poisoning his father. The law took the forfeit of the of the Underhill estate for felony, but it was regranted to Fulke's younger brother Hercules [knighted in 1617] when he came of age in 1602. In Michaelmas term of that year, Hercules Underhill confirmed the sale of New Place to Shakespeare, who paid the prescribed fee, equal to one quarter of the yearly value of the property, to clear the title." - S. Schoenbaum. William Shakespeare: A Compact Documentary Life, OUP, 1980.

Sir Walter Leveson (d. January 1620) of Ashmores near Wolverhampton, a Catholic recusant, as was his sister, Elizabeth; children of Thomas Leveson of Wolverhampton (c. 1533-95), and lovce Leveson (d. 14 March 1608).

Sir Henry Shirley, second baronet (1589-1633), landowner and local politician.

Tolkien Connection. Tolkien married Edith Bratt, illegitimate daughter of Frances Bratt of Wolverhampton. Tolkien perhaps knew of the Underhills as an important local family in Wolverhampton and other areas of Birmingham. In the 16th century the Underhills were also known to have lived in Baginton and Idlicote in Warwickshire. Frodo Baggins on leaving Bag End in the Shire uses, at Gandalf's behest, the name of Mr Underhill.

Defoe (Daniel).- Law (John).- Lovell (*Sir* Salathiel, *Judge, Recorder of London,* 1631/2-1713) Warrant signed to constables and other officers in Westminster, Middlesex, Surrey, Kent and Essex, for the arrest of a highwayman and recovery of the stolen goods, *manuscript on paper, 1p. and conjugate blank, good impression of Lovell's seal, 12th February* 1693/4, "on Tuesday last, there was feloniously stole from Robert Wescombe and Thomas Knight, upon the Kings highway a Dapple Gray Gelding, a Browne Nagg a Bright Gray Nagg, and other goods and Chattles of a Considerable value, And that hee [Robert Wescombe] hath in suspition divers lewd idle and disorderly persons within the Citties or Counties aforesaid to have Comitted the said Robbery...", note in another hand to foot "This Warrant to remaine in the hands of John Connell", *light surface soiling, heavier on panel of conjugate blank, very slightly creased at foot.* 

\* CONNECTIONS TO DANIEL DEFOE AND JOHN LAW. AS Recorder of London, Lovell was one of the most prominent and controversial 'hanging' judges of his time with a reputation for corruption, largely because of his close association with 'thief-takers'. Among the most notorious of these was John Connell, to whom this present warrant was given. Lovell presided over the trial of Daniel Defoe, an open critic of his, for seditious libel, sentencing him to a fine, public humiliation for days in a pillory, and an indeterminate term of imprisonment. In 1694, Lovell sentenced Scottish economist and financier John Law to death for the murder of Edward 'Beau' Wilson during a duel in Bloomsbury Square. Law was incarcerated in Newgate Prison but later escaped to Amsterdam and then Paris where he founded the Mississippi Company.

Copies of the accounts were circulating in manuscript in the eighteenth century, one of which was purchased by Richard Gough in 1771. In British Topography (1780) Gough attributed the manuscript to William Orem (d. 1692), town clerk of Old Aberdeen. This mistake was then repeated in the four editions of the manuscript that were published between 1782 and 1832." - Oxford DNB.





Bentham (Jeremy, philosopher, jurist and reformer, 1748-1832) Autograph Letter signed to [William Petty] Earl of Shelburne [Later 1st Marquess of Lansdowne], 4pp., 323 x 201mm., Lincoln's Inn, 19th July 1781, on the improvement of the Poor Laws, in which England falls short of Scotland, and his meeting with the Earl of Shelburne, the man who would become his great friend and patron, "your Lordship, I think, was pleased to drop a hint or two concerning a plan you had in contemplation for the improvement of the Poor Laws. Since then I have received a letter...on which that matter stands in Scotland [by James Anderson], I thought it might perhaps be a satisfaction to you to peruse...The marginal-commenting (that your Lordship may not be startled at it) is a sort of hobby-horse exercise of mine, which the weakness of my frame forces me to be practicing upon all occasions", docketed in another hand, folds.

\* Bentham's close association with William Petty, 2nd Earl Shelburne began in summer 1781, the year before Shelburne became Prime Minister, when he visited Bentham at his chambers in Lincoln's Inn. Shelburne invited Bentham to spend part of the summer at Bowood, his country house. After some hesitation – for Bentham thought he ought first to establish his reputation amongst England's political and intellectual elite by bringing out his *Introduction to the Principles of Morals and Legislation* – he visited Bowood and established a relationship with Shelburne which lasted for many years. James Anderson of Hermiston (1739-1808), farmer, journalist and author, was a prominent figure in the Scottish Enlightenment and invented the Scotch plough.

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

From 1825 he was posted with his regiment to the Ionian Islands, but having contracted Malaria, he was forced to return home in 1830. By the time of his departure he had achieved the rank of Major-General.



other in 1809. They narrowly survived the 1804 Haitian massacre and after time in America where their mother died, returned to Haiti to be with their father. The following year, British and Spanish forces began to besiege the French garrison. Desperate for food, François Touzi ventured outside the city walls and was fatally shot by the Spanish, leaving the children to fend for themselves in the city. Later, Lucinde made a dangerous crossing to Curaçao in an open boat, which was intercepted by a British warship. Lucinde was taken back to Britain by Captain Thomas Symonds who later married her and arranged for her twin to join her, and she married Major General Alexander Gordon in 1822, a younger son of the Marquess of Huntly and Duke of Gordon.





One leaf reads with some legibility "too long to write / come in when you can but come ALONE or with that good oirishman you bro't the time before | ya'ssr, wil prsent poEM to La Martinelli" and initialled "EF lan".

Others are not quite so coherent: "Cut the cackle / Congrats, if you like, but say if they are inter4sted in accuracy, Not god damn it that they are. or would be allowed to be/ I suggest you verify the following statement re/Mr Pound's actual position. | Then the rest of yrs / is o.k. they wont print it. but not harm in education at least one office typist. | DONT say you have seen me / | Position perfectly clear to anyone who reads what is in print. | Have you ever READ the Constitution, have yu a copy?...|" [sic].

And others devolve even further with his notorious anti-semitic ramblings.

All together an odious though thankfully largely incomprehensible collection, reflecting Pound's decline in his final years at St Elizabeth's. A fragment of an appalling, if fascinating piece of history.



Another larger view by Abdallah is held in the Khalili Collection (see acc. no. MSS 1077), which is recorded as having been 'commissioned by the Sharif of Mecca to depict the sacred monuments of his realm in the second quarter of the 19th century'. The Khalili version is the earliest known accurate bird's-eye plan of the city, and while the present work clearly relates to it, it does bear a number of differences in the layout of streets and architecture of the buildings. As such it may be a slightly later "studio" version after the Khalili version, or another version by Abdallah himself, but it seems unlikely that it was an independent study from life.

from Kutahya. The book was inspired by an episode when the Prophet Muhammed

answered questions from Jewish scholars who doubted his prophethood. The number of

questions varies from three to seven or even forty in different accounts. Firald's book,

possibly attempting to be comprehensive, contains forty questions on subjects such as the creation, the afterworld, angels, religions, the apocalypse, etc. The answers are mostly based on Qur'an verses, which are highlighted with a red pen in the present manuscript. - "Kirk Sutar ends with a colophon on page 206v, followed immediately by an appendix containing

"Jawahir al-Islam" [Cevahir-ill Islam], a popular anonymous catechism here evidently

written by the same scribe, in the same style. This short treatise is composed of 34 simple

questions and straightforward answers mostly focusing on religious duties. The questions

are marked with the phrase, "Eger sorsalar" (If they ask you), written in red. The first page of the book is inscribed with the familiar invocation "Ya Kebikec" ("Oh Kabikaj"): in the Islamic manuscript tradition, it was believed that this spell would protect the manuscript from insects and worms. Although Kabikaj was originally the name of a plant that was mixed with ink to repel insects, it later became mythical and was thought to be a genie, the sheikh of bookworms, or a book-protecting angel. A magic square drawn on the last page of the book serves a similar apotropaic purpose.



William Charles de Meuron Wentworth-Fizwilliam, 7th Earl Fitzwilliam (1872-1943), politician and army officer, one of the richest men in England once he had inherited the earldom on the death of his grandfather. He was born in a remote part of Canada, where his parents were reputedly travelling for his father's health, which later caused controversy over his inheritance to the title. It was suggested that he was a changeling, a baby brought into the family in an attempt to rid it of epilepsy and to claim the title for that side of the family.

In 1808 she came to the attention of George Douglas, Earl of Morton, who sponsored her to receive lessons from the RA painter William Craig. The Society of Arts awarded her a medal for a historical miniature in 1821, and the Royal Academy accepted her paintings. The Royal Family commissioned her to paint miniature portraits of them. When the Earl of Morton died in 1827 Biffen was left without a noble sponsor and she ran into financial difficulty. However, Queen Victoria awarded her a Civil List pension and she retired to a private life in Liverpool, where she died on 2nd October 1850 at the age of 66. 





\* Goya's etchings illustrate events he witnessed in Madrid and Zaragoza, his birthplace and where these works were produced after he fled the court in 1810-15. These events were the result of the Peninsular War (1808-1814), in which Napoleon Bonaparte invaded Spain and was met with bloody resistance from the local population, before being defeated by British and Spanish troops.

The images were kept in the artist's country estate, Quinta del Sordo, and were owned by Goya's son Javier until his death in 1854. The war scenes are devoid of the traditional heroism and triumphalism of such representations; the artist focuses on the horror of the war in a modern and original way and surprises by not putting blame exclusively on either side. The French are condemned for the occupation and the Spanish for excessive violence.

- 2.2 We may at our complete discretion refuse to register any Bidder or delay registration if we are not satisfied with the information or documentation provided or the Bidder's creditworthiness, including if the Bidder has previously defaulted in paying for or collecting purchases.
- 2.3 If you are a returning Bidder, we may at our discretion require that you provide updated identity and other documentation before permitting you to bid in an auction.
- 2.4 We do not undertake to register any Bidder in time for any specific auction.
- 2.5 If you are bidding on behalf of another person, you will need to disclose such information in advance of the auction and that person may also need to complete our registration and client due diligence process and provide us with written authority to accept bids from you on his/her/its behalf. - 20.2 Notices will be deemed to have been received:
  - 20.2.1 if delivered by hand, on the day of delivery;
  - 20.2.2 if sent by first class pre-paid post or Recorded Delivery, 2 Business Days after posting, exclusive of the day of posting;
  - 20.2.3 if sent by pre-paid airmail, 5 Business Days after posting, exclusive of the day of posting; or
  - 20.2.4 if sent by email, at the time of transmission unless sent on a day which is not a Business Day or after 17.00 in the place of receipt in which case they will be deemed to have been received on the next Business Day.

### 21. Data Protection

We will hold and process any personal data in relation to you in accordance with our Privacy Policy which can be accessed at: www.forumauctions.co.uk/privacy-policy.

#### 22. General

Our waiver of a breach of any term of these Terms of Sale will not operate as a waiver of breach of any other term or any subsequent breach of that term.
- 22.5 Our Conditions of Business and any dispute or claim arising out of or in connection with them (including any noncontractual claims or disputes) shall be governed by and construed in accordance with the laws of England and Wales and the parties irrevocably submit to the exclusive jurisdiction of the English courts.
