Perotti (Niccolò) Cornucopiae Linguae Latinae, collation: A-B⁸ a-z⁸ & cum⁸ rum⁸ A-O⁶, 307ff. (of 308, lacking final blank), 64 lines, roman type, a3r lower margin with a full-colour coat of arms with extensions of acanthus leaves in maroon, green, red and blue with initials 'FG' added later, guide spaces for initials, very slight fraying to title lower corner, some very faint marginal damp-stains, contemporary vellum-backed boards covered with fifteenth-century manuscript ff., upper cover displaying a 4 line initial in colour, and elsewhere some letters in blue and red, a later paper label laid down to upper cover, some worming (mainly around label), housed in modern black calf drop-back box, scuffed and joints worn, folio (308 x 216mm.), Venice, Baptista de Tortis, 1490.

AN EXCELLENT COPY WITH AN INTERESTING MUSICAL ASSOCIATION. Composer Franchino Gaffurio's third edition copy of Perotti's important commentary on Book I of Martial, which quickly became a standard reference on the Latin language and a sort of encyclopedia of antiquity. At least 36 editions were published before 1536, when Robert Estienne's *Thesaurus linguae Latinae* appeared.

Provenance: Franchino Gaffurio (1451- 1522) the renowned Renaissance composer and musical theorist, court musician to the Sforza in Milan and choirmaster or 'maestro di cappella' at the Duomo. His ownership inscription 'Liber Franchini Gafurij laudinesis Regij musici / corteque mediolanensis phonasci' (88 verso). Meanwhile, an autograph purchase note dated 16 January 1494 (05 verso) states the price of 3 1/2 lire, a very high sum comparative to Gaffurio's likely salary as a music teacher; an indication of his interest in Perotti's work which perhaps he used as an aid for his own teaching, or in the preparation of his own work 'Practica musicae' (1496), full of references to ancient sources such as Plato, Aristotle, Cicero, and Pliny. The title of Perotti's work also features on the inventory of Gaffurio's books made in 1518 when he made a bequest to the Church of the Incornonata in his hometown of Lodi.

* Rare incunable edition of this medieval treatise on the 'last four things' (death, judgement, heaven and hell), generally attributed to Gerhard van de Vliederhoven and Dionysius Carthusiensis. The title woodcut depicts St. Gregory instructing two scholars, and was used often by Quentell between 1491 and 1495. We can trace only two auction records in the last 30 years.



A CONTAINING THE FIRST PRINTED EYE-WITNESS ACCOUNT OF SAVONAROLA'S BONFIRE OF THE VANITIES. First edition, first issue, of Benivieni's Neoplatonic verse summary of the 'Libro dello amore', a commentary on Plato's 'Symposium', published in the wake of Savonarola's tumultuous years of reform in Florence. Humanist Benivieni, along with Tubini, Alopa and Ghirlandi (the printers), were all ardent supporters of Savonarola's thought, with for example, Benivieni having translated Savonarola's 'De Simplicitate' in 1496. Here, across 2ff. (oo6-7), Benivieni describes the famous, dramatic public burning of the city's 'lascivious, vain and detestable objects', known as the Bonfire of the Vanities, held in the Piazza della Signoria during the Carnival on 7 February 1497, offering a detailed list including paintings, musical instruments, feminine ornaments, dice, cards, and other such works of Satan. The edition is known in two variants: this copy appears as the first issue with colophon dated 7 September, and lines 24-25 of the table on [π]3r.

Provenance: from the library of the Carthusian monastery at Casotto in Piedmonte (1172-1802) [title inscription 'Cartusia Casularum mihi a M. de ducibus donato', in the same hand as many of the marginal annotations]; and several other ownership inscriptions to title and front endpaper.



A FIRST EDITION OF DÜRER'S IMPORTANT TREATISE DEALING WITH THE PROPORTIONS OF THE HUMAN BODY, INFLUENCED BY EUCLID, VITRUVIUS AND LEONARDO DA VINCI. The work was still unfinished when Dürer died so its publication was undertaken by his widow Agnes, and it was soon translated into Latin by Joachim Camerarius to broaden its readership.

This copy with the woodcuts in book 2 bearing letter identification, possibly indicating a later issue.



& A Venetian printing of the 'Calepinus', the most famous and widely used Latin lexicon by scholars from the Renaissance well into the 18th century. Appearing in over 200 editions, it is still considered the paramount reference work for historical language research by classical philologists, linguists and historians. Ambrogio Calepino (1435-1511), came from Bergamo and belonged to the Augustinian order.



A stunning first edition copy of Domenichi's Italian translation of Plutarch's 'Vitae' in its original contemporary Venetian binding, the two volumes recently united after more than a century's separation. Anthon Lodewijk was a famous Flemish craftsman active in Venice between 1553 and 1557, whose skills were employed by printer Giolito to create luxurious presentation copy bindings for distinguished clients. Lodewijk's style is resonant of the famous Venetian 'Mendoza' or 'Fugger Binder', but he used his own kit of Italian tools. By the early 20th century, these two volumes had become separated, being individually traceable throughout that time until reunification in recent decades. This separation explains the copper plaquette on volume 1; likely an addition made during this time by a skilful forger who sought to augment the volume's desirability to collectors as a particularly sumptuous example of renaissance binding or simply as a curiosity - perhaps added by Milanese bookbinder and known forger Vittorio Villa (late 19th century) or his successor Domenico Conti Borbone (early 20th century).



Seemingly a scarce imprint, all by Calvinist bookseller Antoine Vincent in Lyon, with USTC listing no copies of any in the UK.

A beautiful copy of Lodovico Domenichi's Italian translation of Plutarch's *Vite*, once belonging to the Italian aristocratic Cesi family. The splendid fore-edges bear the full Cesi crest of tree rising from six stylised hills, that of the first volume still particularly rich in colour, and imbue a distinct feeling of luxury to this otherwise sombre and discreet example of sixteenth century armorial binding. This edition of the 'Vite' a re-issue by Giolito with a recomposed title-page dated 1560 (first edition 1555).

Provenance: likely from the library of Federcio Cesi, Duke of Acquasanta (1585-1630), founder of the Accademia dei Lincei (Lincean Academy) in 1603, and one of the most influential patrons of Galileo Galilei. A copy of Giolito's edition of the Vite is mentioned in an inventory of Federico's books located at Acquasparta which never entered the Lincean Academy; seemingly compiled in 1631 following his death to divide inheritance between his second wife, Isabella Salviati (sister of mathematician Francesco Salviati) and his brother, Giovanni Federico Cesi.



& Girolamo Cardano's (1501-76) seminal work on metoposcopy, a form of divination in which one's personality and destiny is predicted through reading the lines or wrinkles on the forehead, written in 1558 but published posthumously. Metoposcopy was an ancient practice popularised during the Renaissance by Cardano, who claimed to identify seven horizontal planes on the forehead that corresponded with astrological alignments.

* First edition copy of one of the most influential works by the well-known German Jesuit, who was an eclectic scholar, inventor, collector, and founder of the Museum Kircherianum in the Roman College. In this monumental work, which is dedicated to Emperor Leopold I, Kircher builds an exhaustive scientific system based on logical combinations and symbolic logic formulae capable of expressing each truth; it thus represents one of the most celebrated seventeenth-century attempts at creating a universal language for scientists and philosophers to describe and circumscribe all knowledge into a unified system.



* DEDICATION COPY OF THE FIRST COMPREHENSIVE FRENCH DICTIONARY ON SHIPPING, WITH PLATES OF FLAGS COLOURED IN A CONTEMPORARY HAND. Louis Alexandre de Bourbon, Comte de Toulouse (1678-1737), was the illegitimate son of Louis XIV and his mistress Francoise-Athenais, marquise de Montespan. He became a legitimised Prince du Sang with the right to inherit the French throne, and grand admiral of France at the age of five. In 1696 he was created a marshal of France, becoming commander of the royal armies the following year.


* The Beckford Sale is one of the most remarkable in the annals of book collecting. The catalogues comprise the two libraries of Hamilton Palace, known as the Beckford Library and the Hamilton Library. The former assembled by William Beckford (1760-1844), 'one of the greatest collectors of the day' attracted solely by the rarity, beauty and artistry of old books and MSS (de Ricci, pp.84-5), and the latter by Alexander Hamilton, 10th Duke of Hamilton (1767-1852), a notorious dandy and incorrigible antiquarian. The Beckford library realised the enormous sum of £73,551. 18s, while the smaller Hamilton library realised £12,892. 12s. 6p. The sales were important for Bernard Quaritch's history, who managed to be a particularly successful buyer, 'gathering into his stores practically everything that was worth having in those gigantic libraries'. (de Ricci p.159).

'Unlike Charlotte and Branwell, Emily left few drafts, few exercises, to tell the story of her apprenticeship in painting. Her drawings and rough sketches are as fragmentary, and as elusive of interpretation, as her surviving poetry... Judging by surviving examples, Emily made fewer copies of engravings than her siblings.' [op. cit. The Art of the Brontës, 1995, pp.105-106]

The painting, a water-colour, is a portrait of a girl with wind-swept hair, wearing a white dress with a blue cloak thrown rather loosely round her. The tradition of the family is that the picture is called "The North Wind". It is not clear how it earned this title... [but] It will be remembered that Anne Brontë wrote a poem called "The North Wind" and Emily one called "A Wreath of Snow", in both of which poems a captive girl welcomes the cold because it reminds her of her native northern mountains.' 



In 1836, Claire married Constantin Heger (1809-96), a teacher at her school. Charlotte and Emily Brontë enrolled in the school in 1842 as pupils and teachers. Charlotte fell headlong in love with Constantin Heger and sent him numerous letters. Heger tore the letters up but Madame Heger rescued them and repaired them. They were given to the British Museum and were eventually published in *The Times* newspaper in 1913. Charlotte's time in Brussels with the Hegers furnished her with significant material for her later novels, especially *The Professor* and *Villette*.

Rorke's Drift.- England (Edward Lutwyche, army officer serving with Col Evelyn Wood's column, later Major-General, d. 1910) AUTOGRAPH LETTER SIGNED TO HIS SISTER FRANCES CATHERINE ENGLAND, 5pp., 8vo, Camp Col Woods Column [South Africa], 28th January [1879], a contemporary account of the Battle of Isandlwhana and the subsequent action at Rorke's Drift, Battle of Isandlwhana, "I suppose you will have read in the papers before you received this of the terrible disaster that has befallen the Generals Column on the 22nd... as far as we can make out the Generals camp was about 7 miles in advance of Rorke's drift and having heard of a large body of Kaffirs in the neighbourhood left the camp in charge of Col Pulleine 24 Regt with 4 companies and two guns... He seems to have missed the Kaffirs but Col Durnford... fell in with them in another direction and being hard pressed sent to Col Pulleine for assistance the Col went out with 3 companies but in the meantime Col Durnfords force had been defeated. 

One of thirteen children, Thomas Cupper Mudd was born in Suffolk to Thomas and Elizabeth Coe Mudd of Huntingfield. Two of Thomas' older brothers had already emigrated to America by 1912. His brother James was the first to leave, sometime in 1907, settling in Radnor, Pennsylvania where he worked as a gardener, his brother George following in 1911. Thomas, working as a bookkeeper, booked a second-class ticket aboard the maiden voyage of the Titanic for £10, 10s (ticket number S.O./P.P. 3), which set sail on 10th April 1912. He wrote this letter to his mother while onboard a day later from Queenstown, Ireland, the last port of call before the ship's fateful collision in the final hour of 14th April. Thomas Mudd perished in the sinking, and his body, if recovered, was never identified. At only 16, he was one of the youngest victims of the Titanic disaster.

Fanny Catherine Knight, later Lady Knatchbull, was Jane Austen's niece, the oldest child of Jane's brother Edward Austen (later Knight). Jane adored her and considered her "almost another Sister". Edward's wife died when Fanny was only 15 so her aunts Jane and Cassandra Austen took on an intimate and motherly role in the lives of Edward's children. In a letter dated 1808 Jane wrote "I am greatly pleased with your account of Fanny; I found her in the summer just what you describe, almost another Sister, & could not have supposed that a niece would ever have been so much to me. She is quite after one's own heart...tell her that I always think of her with pleasure".

In 1820 Fanny married Sir Edward Knatchbull (and their children took the additional Hugessen name). It would seem that Fanny gifted the books to her son, Edward, around the time of his 10th birthday (Edward Hugessen Knatchbull-Hugessen, 1st Baron Brabourne). Fanny is known to have gifted others of her children copies of Jane's works, and this childhood gift may have inspired Edward's interest in his great aunt's life and works. He went on to collect and edit the first edition of Jane Austen's letters, published in 1884, which included about two-thirds of her surviving letters, inherited from his mother Fanny at her death in 1882. Later, in the 1890s, Edward by then Lord Brabourne, sold his private collections in auctions at Sotheby's and Puttick and Simpson, including many original letters and autograph manuscripts from Jane, as well as these present works.

Brontë is known to have held Thackeray in high esteem, dedicating the second edition of Jane Eyre to him, after much admiring his recently released Vanity Fair (1848): "I see in him an intellect profounder and more unique than his contemporaries have yet recognised; because I regard him as the first social regenerator of the day". The two first met at a dinner party given by publisher George Smith in late 1849, the meeting reputedly stilted by Brontë's shyness. Another dinner party, held by Thackeray in Brontë's honour in June 1850, appears to have been no more successful, with Brontë perceived as serious and in outmoded dress by her fellow guests. Despite moments of awkwardness, the important literary relationship between Brontë and Thackeray evidently stemmed from a deep mutual appreciation.

Villette was Brontë's last novel to be published in her lifetime. Thackeray posthumously published her fragment 'Emma' in his *Cornhill Magazine* (April 1860), accompanied by a personal tribute: "An impetuous honestly seemed to me to characterise the woman...Hundreds of those who, like myself, recognised and admired that master-work of a great genius, will look with a mournful interest and regard and curiosity upon this, the last fragmentary sketch from the noble hand which wrote *Jane Eyre*".

The first mentioned is the first edition of Avogadro's magnum opus, containing his most important hypothesis, which established a method for distinguishing between atoms and molecules in a gas. Based on his hypothesis, it was possible to arrive at a constant that determined the number of molecules in a mole (a unit of measurement of the amount of a substance). Years after his death, this number was named the 'Avogadro number' in his honor.

The third mentioned contains Cauchy's famed equation, which determined the relationship between the wavelength of light and the refractive index of a material the light passes through. It is a continuation and expansion of his earlier work, of the same title, published in Paris in 1830, the earlier publication numbering 24pp. as opposed to 236pp.

The fourth mentioned is the rare first edition of Legendre's great work on the theory of elliptic functions, its application to geometry and mechanics, methods of constructing elliptical tables, Eulerian integrals, etc. This copy is complete with the three supplements published successively in 1828, 1829 and 1832.

Sailing Alone Around the World is the superb narrative of the first single-handed circumnavigation of the globe and the "justly admired record of [Slocum's] seamanship, character, and navigational skill" (ANB).

In 1892, he was given the Spray, a small weather-beaten 37-foot oyster sloop designed for coastal sailing. After rebuilding the sloop, Slocum left Boston in 1895 for his three-year solo voyage.

In Chapter X, he shields from a storm and gets the *Spray* into a snug nook in Port Angosto, still 60 miles short of his next destination towards Cape Pillar and the Pacific. Laden with tallow and salvaged cargo, he just escapes from a brush with the native Feugians and gets out of his anchorage, though not before drifting around - namely the eponymous dedicatee of the inscription – Alan Erric Island.

The eponymous Alan Erric is not mentioned in detail, but alluded to only as an acquaintance: "I named it Alan Erric Island, after a worthy literary friend whom I had met in strange by–places" – p.132. A rare association inscription and link to this maritime literary cornerstone.







 - 20.2.3 if sent by pre-paid airmail, 5 Business Days after posting, exclusive of the day of posting; or
 - 20.2.4 if sent by email, at the time of transmission unless sent on a day which is not a Business Day or after 17.00 in the place of receipt in which case they will be deemed to have been received on the next Business Day.

21. Data Protection
